To date, we have not sent a single girl to an institution of higher learning and we are looking forward to seeing one or more girls in those institutions soon.

Renovations

We finished the renovation work on three blocks of 13 classrooms at Chumani Primary school late last month. This was made possible through the generous contributions of Calgary South Rotary Club and Wild Rose Foundation. It marked the First phase of their donation to the school. We are in the process of looking for more partners towards this cause.

Owing to the political situation that has been prevailing for the past two months, our partners decided that we wait until the situation calmed down before we embark on the next project when approved.

Politics

Aah, ladies and gentlemen! Here in Kenya, we have been talking politics, playing politics, eating and sleeping politics. When we do not talk of our own politics, we talk about the American Illinois senator, Barrack Obama. It has helped a lot to drown our own sorrows.
